These boots be made for loving and that's just what you'll do

Ah truly, there's no business quite like shoe business. Feel-good and foot-stomping *Kinky Boots* in the Regent on Broadway kicks considerable butt with its free-flowing exuberance and energy. On opening night, the show also eventually managed to coax a standing ovation from large portions of a notoriously difficult-to-impress Palmy audience. That's just one of the achievements this production is entitled to chalk up.

As interpreted by 'Girls Just Wanna Have Fun' chum Cyndi Lauper, the musical tells how a foundering, down-atheel (ahem) Northampton, England shoe factory attained a market 're-boot'. Based on a true story, Lauper and her confederates also manage to put a new spin on a couple of tales by the Brothers Grimm, mashing together elements of *The Elves and the Shoemaker* and *Cinderella*.

A multi award-winning musical, *Kinky Boots* became a stage hit early last decade, so it's impressive to see it in full riot on stage here so soon. And as a prelude to October's Palmy Drag Fest, its season couldn't be more timely.

When against his wishes and better judgement Charlie Price becomes responsible for restoring the fortunes of a failing family footwear firm, his attempts to defend a woman from a London street mugging is serendipitous. The 'woman' is none other than Lola, a savvy drag-queen cabaret diva who, it just so happens, has problems finding flashy but durable high-heeled boots. Charlie takes Lola back to Northampton to design a rescue range of sexy thigh-high show-biz heels in time for the Milan Fashion Show. Let's just say that this course of vocational true love doesn't run smooth. The show explores the ups and many downs of this relationship, as well as the reactions of Charlie's job-threatened working-class factory 'elves', and also from Nicola – his ambitious go-getter girlfriend. Turns out, Charlie and Lola have more in common than they realise – both are resisting the demands and expectations of their pushy fathers.

Now in any Cinderella story, there has to be a fairy godmother, and the magic here comes from company professional Paul Fagamalo as Lola – aka "Simon from Clacton". "Braggaty cissy boy" Lola, the trained son of a prize-fighter, has carved out a successful niche in the world of drag entertainment. Channelling an inner Tina Turner, Fagamalo is not only a master of the 'flam and glam' with all the poise, moves and a 'rockaria' vocal range, but can also pull his character's personality right back, showing sensitivity and humility. This is especially apparent during Lola's efforts to fit in with the northern factory crowd by dressing down and acting 'normal'. There's also the heartfelt and affecting 'Hold Me in Your Heart' that Lola performs at his dying father's rest home. Throughout, Fagamalo not only sets a high performance standard but shows plenty of generosity towards his fellow community cast members. Local, Lindsay Yeo continues to make great progress in musical theatre. Complementing Lola, the role of strait-laced Charlie – 'Prince' and heir to the Price family shoebox – fits Yeo like a well-made pair of brogues. He portrays the temperamental, self-doubting and career-choice conflicted 'Mr Price' with a well-pitched vocal dexterity and intensity, accompanied by convincing angst.

Kinky Boots has plenty of roles for established and emerging local talents. Among those making the most of this opportunity are Tamzin Price as a winsome Lauren, Keiran Murphy's folksong singing Harry, a pugnacious Jayden Colban as Don, Erica Ward's stroppy Trish, Milana Mariu-Reade as an emotionally manipulating Nicola and the colourful bevy of Lola's 'transgentry' Angels.

Kinky Boots is a show with heart and (dare I say it) soles, humanity, and humour. Auckland and Waikato-based director Richard Neame and his production team underpin this entertaining frolic with sound performance values, slick scene changes and lighting cues, and plenty of pace. Backed by a tight and tuneful 11-piece band, *Kinky Boots* has all the grooves and the moves, the coifs and the cossies, the appeal and warmth to welcome in spring with a high-stepping froufrou fling.

Go along, have fun and dare to let these kinky boots 'walk all over you'. These boots be made for loving and that's just what you'll do.

The original novel may get a new adaptation

Gaston Leroux's 1910 novel *The Phantom Of The Opera*, which was previously adapted into the blockbuster musical of the same name, is expected to get the small screen treatment. A new report from Deadline has said that Kenny Ortega, who tackled the *High School Musical* and *Descendants* series, will oversee the new series, titled *Phantom*, with the hopes that a franchise similar to *Descendants* will emerge. Circling a Disney Plus run, it is being written by Giovanni M Porta (*At Midnight*) from a story by Porta and Eric Bromberg. Things are reported still very early doors, but hopes are high. Leroux's tale, set in the 1880s, follows a reclusive figure who is obsessed with a young soprano that he wants to take under his wing. The musical, which was turned into a film in 2004, is currently playing in the West End. It closed on Broadway last spring.

MAYBE HAPPY ENDING

Opens 12 November

MAYBE HAPPY ENDING, a futuristic romantic musical comedy by Will Aronson and Hue Park, stars Darren Criss and Helen J. Shen as a pair of abandoned helper-bots who find love and connection in an isolating world. The show rides to Broadway on the buzz it's accumulated through years of productions; a 2016 Koreanlanguage world premiere in Seoul, followed by mountings in Japan and China, and a 2020 English-language debut at Atlanta's Alliance Theatre. The original musical is directed by Tony winner Michael Arden, who earned his trophy just last year for helming the Broadway revival of Parade. Opens 14 November

Katie Brayben brings her Olivier Award-winning performance as televangelist Tammy Faye Bakker to Broadway, leading a cast that also includes two-time Tony winner Christian Borle as her husband Jim Bakker and two-time Tony winner Michael Cerveris as Reverend Jerry Falwell. With a book by James Graham, the show also brings a brand-new score from Elton John, the rock-star composer behind Broadway's *AIDA*, *BILLY ELLIOT, Lestat* and *THE LION KING* (Jake Shears of Scissor Sisters writes the lyrics). Rupert Goold directs the production, returning to Broadway with his first musical since *American Psycho*. *Previews 19 October / Opens 14 November / Palace Theatre*

SWEPT AWAY

Opens 19 November

The Avett Brothers set their music to a fully conceived stage musical about the 1884 shipwreck that inspired their 2004 concept album, *Mignonette*. Directed by Tony winner Michael Mayer (*Spring Awakening, american IDIOT*), the show stars Tony winner John Gallagher, Jr, two-time Tony nominee Stark Sands, Wayne Duvall and Adrian Blake Enscoe as the four-man crew cast adrift in a lifeboat after their yacht is sunk. Tony-winning playwright John Logan (*Red*) writes the book that binds the time-tested folk-rock score, which will also be bolstered by nautical stage craft fit for a Broadway stage. *Previews 29 October / Opens 19 November / Longacre Theatre*

Robert Zemeckis' 1992 dark comedy about the price of eternal beauty is bringing some of Broadway's best to the Lunt-Fontanne Theatre. Tony nominees Megan Hilty and Jennifer Simard star as washed-up actress Madeline Ashton and her mild-mannered frenemy Helen Sharp—the pair of looks-conscious women fighting for the affections of plastic surgeon Dr Ernest Menville (two-time Tony nominee Christopher Sieber). Michelle Williams, of Broadway and Destiny's Child fame, plays Viola Van Horn, purveyor of the magic potion that is sure to inspire some ghoulish visual effects. Directed and choreographed by Tony winner Christopher Gattelli, the show has a book by Marco Pennette and music and lyrics by Julia Mattison and Noel Carey. *Previews 23 October / Opens 21 November / Lunt-Fontanne Theatre*

<u>GYPSY</u>

Opens 19 December

It's Audra's turn in Jule Styne, Stephen Sondheim and Arthur Laurents' oft-revived musical about striptease artist Gypsy Rose Lee and the stage mother that made her. Audra McDonald, a six-time Tony-winning stage icon, is taking her crack at the infamous Momma Rose in a new production directed by George C. Wolfe at the newly renovated Majestic Theatre. Wolfe and McDonald previously collaborated on the 2016 Tony-nominated production of *Shuffle Along, Or The Making of the Musical Sensation of 1921 and All That Followed*, so the pair have a proven track record when it comes to revisiting classics with a modern eye. And as the first Broadway revival to be produced after the passing of all three of its original creators, this *GYPSY* could have fewer creative constraints than ever before. *Previews 21 November / Opens 19 December / Majestic Theatre*

WHY AM I SO SINGLE?

SIX creators Lucy Moss and Toby Marlowe are bringing us their next "big fancy musical, *WHY AM I SO SINGLE*?, with an imminent world premiere official opening night set for 12 September. What to do when you're struggling to find a follow-up to a global phenomenon (whilst also being embroiled in romantic woes)? Decide to write a musical about that, of course! Can lightning strike twice with this semi-autobiographical offering? The wait will soon be over. (Garrick Theatre in London, from 27 August 2024.)

NOW THAT'S WHAT I CALL A MUSICAL

Director-choreographer Craig Revel Horwood is putting the world premiere cast of *NOW THAT'S WHAT I CALL A MUSICAL* (led by Nina Wadia with Melissa Jacques or Sam Bailey) through their paces this month ahead of an impending debut. Inspired by the iconic NOW compilation albums, the show revolves around two schoolfriends in 1989 and their reunion 20 years later and features timeless hits from the likes of Whitney Houston, Wham!, Blondie, Tears For Fears and Spandau Ballet. There'll also be guest appearances from popstars such as Sinitta, Sonia, Carol Decker, and Jay Osmond along the way! (On tour from 6 September 2024.)

A FACE IN THE CROWD

Billed as a "cautionary tale about the dangers of celebrity, power, and politics" in which a local radio producer interviews an incarcerated drifter in his jail cell, the Young Vic's outgoing artistic director Kwame Kwei-Armah directs a stellar cast that includes Ramin Karimloo, Anoushka Lucas and Olly Dobson. CAKE: THE MARIE ANTOINETTE PLAYLIST

Although the Marie Antoinette-infused pop musical has been staged in concert versions on tour and at the West End's Lyric Theatre, *CAKE* will finally be seen in a fully staged production in London this autumn. Telling a tale of scandal and retribution for the ill-fated French monarch (played by Zizi Strallen) after she meets commoner Jeanne (Renée Lamb), the cast also includes Millie O'Connell and a returning Travis Ross. BECOMING Nancy

Set in 1979, the piece follows David Starr, a brilliant sixth former with a penchant for pop idols like Blondie, Sting, and Kate Bush. It has music by Stiles and Drewe, who are always worth a listen! (Birmingham Rep, from 2 October to 2 November 2024.)

FLY MORE THAN YOU FALL

Set for its UK premiere this autumn is Eric Holmes and Nat Zegree's new musical *FLY MORE THAN YOU FALL,* telling the story of Malia, a young girl whose life is upended when her mother is diagnosed with terminal cancer and yet finds solace in her writing. Holmes is known for his work on stagey TV series *Smash*, so we're certainly keeping an eye on this one. (southwark Playhouse Elephant in London, from 18 October to 23 November 2024.)

Another show that has been experienced in a concert format – at New York's Carnegie Hall and in London's West End – is *SUPERYOU*. Lourds Lane's rock-infused musical, which follows a comic book artist who discovers self-love and her own voice as her superheroine creations come to life, has now been reimagined as a completely sung-through production and is about to debut in Leicester.
